Michael's ability to absorb and understand information was unparalleled. He had a gift for distilling and organizing information that made him a talented writer and an excellent teacher. But it was his generous spirit in sharing his talents that made him memorable to so many. One of his customers has said, "Michael made me believe again - that there can be integrity and kindness and genius in the web development world". In his personal life, he was equally generous, always ready to help family and friends with his incisive thoughts and problem solving abilities, no matter the topic.

Michael's creative vision didn't stop with business. Wherever he lived he was a creator of beautiful gardens. It was his joy and his therapy to putter in the garden and go plant shopping with his wife, Irene. At one point, his kids playfully recommended an "intervention" when his plant buying was particularly keen. Boating was another lifetime love of Michael's, as was travel. He and his family enjoyed many adventurous trips together, including boating on San Francisco Bay.

Michael is survived by his wife of 35 years, Irene, his children, Greg and Mandy, his brother Larry and wife Ann, his sister, Patsy and husband, Richard, and life-long friend Loralee, as well as his many nieces and nephews and the Stratton clan: Patti, Joyce, Steven and Barry.
